SCRIPTURE READINGS

We invite each guest to participate in sharing this moment of reading scripture at their comfort level.

Philippians 2:1-11

If, then, there is any comfort in Christ, any consolation from love, any partnership in the Spirit, any tender affection and sympathy, make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or empty conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, assuming human likeness. And being found in appearance as a human, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death – even death on a cross. Therefore, God exalted him even more highly and gave him the name that is above every other name, so that at the name given to Jesus, every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess, that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Luke 22:14-20

When the hour came, he took his place at the table, and the apostles with him. He said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer, for I tell you, I will not eat it until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God." Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he said, "Take this and divide it among yourselves, for I tell you that from now on I will not drink of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." And he did the same with the cup after supper, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood.



SCRIPTURE READINGS

Continued

John 13:1-17

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already decided that Judas son of Simon Iscariot would betray Jesus. And during supper, Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from supper, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had reclined again, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, slaves are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.



DISCUSSION PROMPTS

When you think of the word "service", what's the first thing that comes to mind?

Why do you think Jesus chose something as ordinary and earthly as foot washing to show his love?

If you have experienced a Maundy Thursday before, what has it looked like?

Have you ever experienced someone serving you in a humbling way? How did that impact you?

Where in your life might you need to slow down and receive care or grace?



Preparing for the Foot/Hand Washing

Creating a Space of Grace and Care

The foot or hand washing moment can be a deeply meaningful and symbolic act of love and service, but it's also important to approach it with sensitivity. Let your group know that participation is entirely optional - this is a space of grace, not pressure. You might offer hand washing as an alternative to foot washing, or invite guests simply to observe if that's more comfortable. Setting a peaceful tone can make the moment more impactful; consider playing soft background music or offering a moment of silence or prayer beforehand. Prepare a small station with a basin or bowl, a pitcher of warm water, and towels for drying – placing a towel underneath the basin is helpful in case of spills. Guests may choose to pair off, form a circle, or take turns in whatever way feels most natural to your group. Before beginning, you might say a few words to frame the experience, such as: "This simple act reminds us of Jesus' love and humility - serving others with gentleness and grace." The goal is not to perform the act perfectly, but to offer one another a tender sign of care and connection.

Water Marks

Jesus probably kneeled down. He probably took Peter's heel in his hands to wash his feet. Have I allowed myself to be loved? Are there water marks on the floor?

"What is Maundy Thursday?"

Maundy Thursday is the night we remember Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples. It's when he washed their feet, shared a final meal, and gave a new commandment: to love one another. This gathering helps us reflect on that love through scripture, prayer, and service.

"What kind of food should I serve?"

A simple meal or light refreshments is perfect. This could be potluck-style, a few snacks, or something more depending on your comfort and time.

→ "How should I set up my space?"

Arrange seating in a circle or around a table to encourage conversation. Set aside an area for the hand/foot washing station with towels and a basin nearby.

→ "What if someone asks a hard question or shares something personal?"

Just listen with compassion. You don't have to have answers—this is about creating space, not solving problems.

\rightarrow "What if I have a question that is not here?"
